News on the West Coast Offshore Wind Supply Chain: July 2025

WHAT'S NEW AT THE COLLABORATIVE?

Though it may seem like we've been quiet, it's been a very newsworthy year so far here at the Blue Wind Collaborative. While the East Coast offshore wind supply chain has ramped up and turbines rise in states like Virginia, executive orders have halted or slowed other projects. The federal administration's hostile stance to renewable energy, including solar and wind, have dimmed any national hopes of opening new lease areas - that said, the West Coast is keeping the course on a climate future that has renewables in a considerable part of state portfolios.

In California, the state legislature, ports, and communities have continued to support offshore wind development, offering the opportunity for our state to engage in this work. We're here to break down what this means for Washington, where we're seeing continued state investment in investigating and activating the offshore wind supply chain.

Here's some news, updates, and more from the collaborative.

Federal Challenges to Offshore Wind

The federal administration's goal of curbing most renewable industries has put offshore wind in a difficult spot. Positions across federal agencies and laboratories that support renewable energy research and development, particularly those focused on offshore wind, have been cut, and an executive order has been issued to stop all new offshore wind permitting. As of last week, the administration has doubled down by <u>rescinding all Wind Energy Areas</u> designated by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management.

And while 17 states and the District of Columbia are fighting back in a joint lawsuit to stop the administration's overreach into state energy plans, a legal victory in court may not be adequate to fully restart investment and planning into new facilities and projects.

Even so, sites that have already been permitted are continuing on their path to development, including all California lease areas. Californians still strongly support offshore wind, with 78 percent of adults in California in favor of offshore wind according

to a 2024 Public Policy Institute survey. This means that Washington will continue to have an opportunity to activate our potential supply chain opportunity alongside California and potentially other states or regions in the future.

2025 Supply Chain Study Underway

Last year, Blue Wind competed for funding to complete an offshore wind supply chain study for Washington state. Though we weren't ultimately awarded the funding, we're pleased to have the opportunity to work with the firm Moffatt and Nichols to bolster the study, and therefore the state's, understanding of the potential of Washington's offshore wind supply chain.

For those of you who participated in the Supply Chain Mapping Working Group, we will not be reactivating the working group, but we hope to offer several ways to stay involved and offer your feedback to be included in the study. We also plan to take everything we've learned together and channel it into new events and activities:

Workforce Workshop

For our friends and labor partners in manufacturing, installation, shipbuilding, and other trades, Maritime Blue is hosting a joint Workforce Workshop with supply chain study contractor Moffatt and Nichols. This will be a two-part event, starting with an in-person Lunch and Learn on Monday, September 8 from 11:30 to 1pm in the Seattle area. Attendees from the labor community or labor employers will have the opportunity to hear from union speakers involved in offshore wind in the U.S., learn more about what's going on in the offshore wind supply chain federally and on the East and West Coasts, and be briefed on what work is going on in Washington to investigate and activate our state's floating platform supply chain.

The feedback portion of the workshop will take place virtually on Tuesday, September 9. Participants will get the chance to see the current state's offshore wind study scope and provide feedback and expertise on what Washington workers and labor can provide for the offshore wind supply chain.

Aviation and Aerospace Workshop

With the state's supply chain study results due in November, Blue Wind is planning a winter workshop for aviation and aerospace suppliers to learn more about how they can diversify their business with new manufacturing opportunities for the West Coast offshore wind supply chain. We'll review results from the state's offshore wind supply chain study, with specialized speakers to talk specifics about manufacturing components for floating platforms. We'll follow up with more details as we get closer to these dates.
